

## The Grand Canyon goes digital

Want a tour of one of the country's most famous landmarks? Don't look for a ranger; reach for your iPhone (or MP3 player or cell phone) instead. If you're someone who winces at the word "docent," download a two-hour audio tour of the park (\$4.99; nps.gov/grca) and a map, and be on your way. Or log onto iTunes (itunes.com) for podcasts on everything from how to raft the canyon to how it was sculpted (and tips on staying safe while hiking it). Finally, at signposted South Rim points of interest between Hermit Road and Yaki Point, you can call 928/225-2907 (if your cell phone gets any bars) for a quick two-minute tale about the area. - SHARAEL KOLBERG

> Singing Wind Bookshop

owner (and disciple of food writer Michael Pollan) Erin Wade makes eating your vegetables fun. Her 10 classic and 12 original salads have names like Eat Your Peas (a mix of baby lettuce, green peas, sautéed mushrooms, and asiago cheese) and the Nutty Pear-fessor, a fresh take on the old pear-and-blue-cheese standby. Much of the produce is sourced from her 10-acre organic farm in nearby Nambé (meat is on the menu too). The restaurant gets hopping at lunch, so go for dinner if you prefer a quiet meal. \$\$; closed Sun; 505/820-9205.
